- The nightly battle between Apophis and the sun god Ra in Egyptian mythology represented the eternal struggle between order and chaos. Each night as Ra entered the underworld, Apophis would rise and attack the solar boat, unleashing on the crui up malevolence in an attempt to return the cosmos to disorder. (7)
- Vulcan, the Roman god of fire and metalworking, was also the patron of craftsmen. He represented the use of intellect over physical perfection in at aust rated often with a limp or other deformity. (5)
